THE SOUNDS OF JOHN WESLEY (CAPITAL CAMPAIGN)

The following is an update as of September 30, 2023.

Our Goal: 2019 Sound System Upgrade \$11,000
Phase I Organ Repairs 6,500
Phase II Organ Repairs 17,200
Phase III Organ Repairs 10,700
Future Phase IV (Peterson Console) 13,000

\$58,400

To date we have raised \$36,675.

We have completed the 2019 Sound System Upgrade, Phase I of the organ repairs, and paid the downpayment for Phase II in order to hold the price.

Phase II balance due will be **\$10,320**. That means we currently have **\$1,975** to start the funding of Phase III. At the current time we are having no issues.

Our magnificent Moller organ is comprised of 36 registers for a total of 43 ranks and is insured for a \$1,332,000 replacement cost.

In order to reach our total goal we will need **\$21,725**. We remind you the Sounds of John Wesley giving envelopes are included with your regular envelopes.



What is the secret to living a spiritual life? So much is happening in our world that we often get distracted and listen to voices other than the voice of God. TRUSTEES PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT

Just a reminder that as we continue to use the spaces in our building more, coordination is important. Church groups can use the Social Hall (or any other rooms in the church) but if it's not a regular reoccurring event, it needs to be cleared with the church office or Trustees Property Committee so that it can be put on the calendar. This is especially important with Kitchen Use. There is also a log-in sheet posted in the kitchen that needs to be signed when the kitchen is used. (Our regularly scheduled Coffee Fellowship is the exception to that.) Outside groups wanting to use space need to fill out a Building Use Form to be approved by the Property Committee.



We have a new (used) commercial refrigerator in the kitchen. Our existing single door refrigerator was having cooling issues. Larry Suddueth was able to obtain a donated refrigerator from his employer. It is a bit larger, and so with a little cleaning up and some cosmetic work was in place and ready for the Mummers' Parade.

All of the Kitchen appliances were inspected in October. The fire suppression hood was inspected in July.

Items to report on or update include:

Church Building

- Two 'live' cameras have been mounted in the courtyard area for over a month now. Two
 more are to be installed on the north side by the Education Wing and ramp door.
- Repairs were done to the Sanctuary A/C system when a thermostatic expansion valve failed. Due to the A/C leak, there was some plaster damage in the Narthex. Larry has been painting the foyer inside the front door, the ceilings in the Narthex and the walls above the chair rail.
- The annual maintenance inspection has been done on the boiler and the boiler has been started for the heating season.
- The handrail by the back door was reattached and secured. The handrail in the front of the church will have the same corrections made. Larry has been painting the fence on the south side as time (and weather) allow.

131 N. Potomac Street

- There was an A/C leak in the 2nd floor unit. The drain from the unit to the overflow was replaced.
- The front door and posts, and the back door have been painted. Larry is working on some of the windows. This is ongoing and what he can safely reach.

Parsonage

• Due to some recent issues with the boiler, we have made some modifications, had the boiler cleaned, had the chimney cleaned, had the controls gone over, and the boiler started up. The boiler is old, but still in good shape.

Handicrafts can spark appreciation for simple items. Weave this basket as a gift.



What you need:

- Paper plate
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Yarn (different colors)

What you do:

- 1. In the center of the plate, trace something round. Draw 9 lines (evenly spaced) from the circle to the plate's edge.
- 2. Cut along each line, stopping at the center circle. Trim more of the plate off so the cuts make a gradual V shape.
- 3. Fold the plate's sides upward to form basket sides. Keep these upright as you weave a bowl-shaped basket.
- 4. Begin weaving a length of yarn at the circle's base. Hold the end of the yarn in place as you spread the length over and under each side of the plate.
- 5. Switch colors to make a pattern. Keep the yarn tight as you weave up the sides.
- 6. To finish, bend down any remaining paper. Leave a tail of yarn and tuck it under a woven portion. Share your craft with a friend!
